Engaging Activities:

- **Phonological Awareness Activities:** Read nursery rhymes and rhyming picture books, count words in sentences and syllables while jumping or bouncing a ball, blend words by playing “Guess the Word”
- **Multisensory activities for handwriting at home:** (handwriting bags, shaving cream, sand/salt, sprinkles/rainbow rice writing, playdoh, bath crayons, sandpaper, body letters, wiki sticks, beans/pom poms with tweezers, sidewalk chalk, painting with water on the fence, bubble wrap overlay)
- **Cursive Handwriting Practice:** Write short notes to your child in cursive and have them write short notes in cursive to you and other family members.
- **Multisensory activities to reinforce HFWs** (High Frequency Words): sand, shaving cream, skywriting, letter tiles, markers, flash cards, BINGO
- **Multisensory activities for language skills at home:** Create tongue twisters and read, rhyming word scavenger hunt, use letter tiles to isolate sounds or syllable, insert/omit prefixes and suffixes from root words, clap/jump out syllables of multisyllable words, think of as many words that start with _____ sound in 1 minute.
- **Vocabulary:** skills can be obtained through fun family games like Charades, Pictionary, and Headbanz
- **Comprehension:** Find a book or series that is interesting to your child and spend time reading with them. Ask your child to predict what will happen next and discuss the characters and plot as you read.

*Always let your child “teach” you what they are learning at school. This is a great way for them to practice coding, spelling, writing, and other skills. This connects you with your child’s learning.
